Developing Christ-Centered Authenticity Through the Examen Prayer



Every December Merriam-Webster announces their "Word of the Year." This word is meant to capture something essential about our society from that year — often reflecting what mattered most to us. It comes as little surprise to me that The Word of the Year for 2023 was "authenticity." This word has special resonance after a year when Artificial Intelligence and "deep fake" videos have been in the news. Authenticity can also be difficult to find in a world where success is often popularly defined not by who we are but by what we can acquire and how we appear to others on the outside.

The Word of the Year got me to thinking: What does it mean to us as Christians to be authentic? What does it mean to be our genuine selves in and through our relationship with Jesus Christ? And by extension, what does it mean for us to honor the true selves of our neighbors — seeing them through the eyes of Christ?

One part of developing our Christian authenticity involves developing deep awareness of ourselves and our neighbor and how God works in our lives. Authenticity develops as we come to know ever better who God made us from the beginning — our full identity as beloved children of God. One way to practice awareness-building is through prayer. One of my favorite prayers for awareness is the Examen, which was first developed by St. Ignatius of Loyola. It is a daily opportunity to become more awake and aware of ourselves in the light of God at work in the world about us.

When you wake up in the morning, as you come to Jesus in prayer, you may ask yourself the following questions:

- What am I grateful for today?
- What am I looking forward to today?
- What am I dreading today? Where are my challenges?
- How might the Spirit be inviting me to be connected with others in and through Christ today?

Ask God for the curiosity to see God at work in big and small ways through the day and the courage to respond to that action in a way that is true to the person God

Thank God for your day and ask God to help you open your mind, heart, and spirit to continue to develop your awareness of yourself, your neighbor, and God at work in relationship.

Regularly praying the Examen can be a wonderful way to start the New Year and develop awareness that leads us to living ever more authentically into our Christian identity.

Deepen Your Foundation for Racial Equity through Sacred Ground Series. Undertake the Sacred Ground journey into American and Church history that helps us better love each other by understanding the historic shadow racism casts on our lives. The Revs. Ted Nitz and Frances Twiggs welcome you on this journey of eleven sessions, either as a first time participant or a repeat attendee. Although the curriculum has white Euro-Americans in mind, Sacred Ground is for every individual and for the Church as a whole, because we have all been impacted by caste systems of race. Like a typical pilgrimage, the pace will be fairly slow, so that we can absorb the beauty and challenge of the landscape with our small group of fellow travelers.

## An Epiphany Treat at January 7 Coffee Hours



On Sunday, January 7, we will celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany, when we honor the Magi who "traveled afar" to see the baby Jesus at Bethlehem. King Cake will be served at coffee hour after the 8 & 10 a.m. services, as well as during Children's Chapel, to celebrate this special day on the Church calendar.

The custom of the King Cake was brought from France to New Orleans in the 1800s. It evolved from the Twelfth Night Festival. A dried bean was hidden inside the cake. Whoever found it received a year of good luck and was treated as royalty. Later, a tiny plastic baby was used to represent the baby Jesus . . . because Twelfth Night is when the Magi found the "babe wrapped in swaddling clothes."

The frostings or sugars decorating this symbolic dessert are: purple (royalty), green (the growth of the Church to the Gentiles — out to the world beyond the Jewish community), and gold (one of the precious gifts).

Come into the Parish Hall on January 7 to enjoy this Epiphany treat and perhaps find the little surprise inside.

## Make Your Space Reservation for 2024 Meetings and Events NOW!

Requests to use space are granted on a first-come, first-served basis and require the completion of the Facilities Use Application form, which is available at the reception desk in the parish office, at the media center in the Parish Hall, and on the church website. The form should be submitted to the Parish Administrator **at least 60 days prior** to the event or meeting.

Even if your group's annual event has taken place at the church in past years, please remember to submit the form to the office within the 60-day window. Requests by internal groups **will not** trump preexisting requests by outside groups, which are required to pay to use church facilities.
