Here comes Summer! Like the quick shift from summer to winter in 2022 without much of a fall season (and with leaves hanging on to trees in their confusion), we are experiencing a quick pivot from winter to summer now with a short window of spring.

We have some days of celebration together ahead of us.

- ◆ June 4 – We celebrate **Trinity Sunday**, with baptisms!
- ◆ July 23 – We have our first outdoor service of the summer for **Church in the Park** at City Park in Coeur d'Alene, at the picnic pavilion near the Human Rights Education Institute.

We will continue to hear from them all through the summer. Many thanks to you all – Kristin, Ian, Ern, Glenda, Holladay, and David.

We are also blessed with many voices leading and lifting our community in prayer. Those who lead us in the Prayers of the People each Sunday take their responsibility seriously and lead us in a spirit of deep prayerfulness that is our continuing conversation with God. And there are those who come together regularly in prayer, at our Tuesday and Wednesday prayer services, and in groups like Daughters of the King and the Prayer Chain. As Ian noted in his recent sermon, prayer is at the heart of all that we do. It is our guiding force.

Impact in the wider Church. As part of my work for the Episcopal Church across the nation and world, your Rector has the honor of directing two significant initiatives. First, I am Program Principal for an initiative called “Thriving in Ministry.” With its institutional base at Virginia Theological Seminary, I am blessed to lead a team of part-time staff located around the country (Idaho, California, and Georgia). We are preparing for a significant training this summer (June 12-17) of 70 candidates as mentor-coaches in clergy leadership development. These mentor-coaches will then guide and direct over 260 Episcopal priests of all ages in individual sessions and peer learning group sessions for two years, working with them to strengthen their skills and develop their habits in ministry and leadership. This initiative, funded by grants from the Lilly Endowment and Trinity Episcopal Church Wall Street, has already worked with over 140 priests since 2018, and is entering a significantly ramped-up, intensified phase for these next five years. By the end of five years, in two-year rounds, we will have trained over 170 mentor-coaches and worked on leadership development with over 750 active priests – well over one-tenth of active priests serving across the Episcopal Church in the U.S., Central America, and Europe. We are already garnering interest among Canadian Anglican priests, Lutheran (ELCA) pastors, and Episcopal deacons and laity.

Second, I am the appointed Chair for the Episcopal Church’s Task Force for Ministry with Individuals with Mental Illness. I have chaired this Task Force since the 2018 General Convention. We are in the process of securing training for instructors in Mental Health First Aid (MHFA), to offer the basic training in congregations, schools, and dioceses across the Episcopal Church. This fall, we will get our first 16 Episcopal instructors trained, who will join four other already trained Episcopal MHFA instructors (I am one of them). These instructors will dedicate three Saturdays a year to providing MHFA basic training in their regions for Episcopal laypeople, clergy and staff. MHFA equips people in the general public with skills to recognize signs of crisis or chronic mental health challenges, to come alongside someone in distress and engage in caring, respectful, and helpful conversation, and to help prepare the way for professional help and social support. This is only one of three significant efforts by the Task Force. We are also developing print-ready brochure-like resources for congregations on some fundamentals about mental illness, mental health, and the role of congregations in offering healthy and welcoming space and in combatting stigma. Finally, we are developing a curriculum for priests and deacons to be trained in effective ministry and spiritual nurture for people wrestling with mental illness. This training will become required for all new clergy and will be strongly recommended to all active clergy.

I share these things to remind us that we are all part of a much wider community of faith that shares a deep commitment to faithful ministry and mission for the sake of Christ and His kingdom of overflowing grace and love. There are others in the St. Luke’s family who are responding to God’s calling to serve in a wide range of local and regional organizations and networks. Marc Wallace has joined the board for Orchard Ridge. Cory Knadler and Maria Nacarrato lead a bible study from their home. Farley Green was featured for her poetry on the radio in Spokane. Several of our folks are active in Rotary and the Chamber of Commerce, the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), P.E.O., Scouts, and the Museum of North Idaho. Several of us write thoughtful letters and stories regularly for local press. Many in our church have been active in supporting our schools, libraries, and healthcare and social service organizations. Many of us will be present at Pride in the Park, and at other important events and gatherings in this region. A group of us is dedicating efforts to reach out and form relationships with students, faculty and staff at North Idaho College. All of these activities are on top of the many ways our jobs and careers give us opportunities to touch

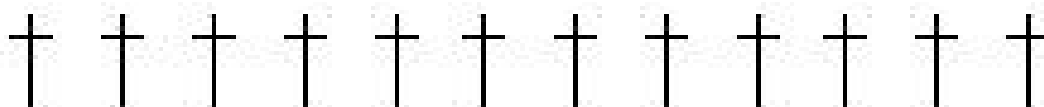

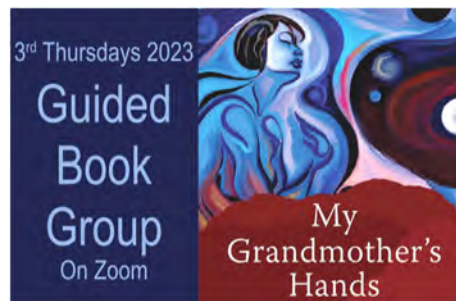
Learning Opportunities

Who Is This Jesus?

Biblical Windows for Followers and Seekers of Christ

When Christ Jesus ascended, he remained in his human nature. Divine and human are now forever united, in the full Being of God.

Now in Pentecost we are all invited to meditate on the full nature of Christ. This text is a vision given to us in a letter from Paul. Please read the passage below, then prayerfully consider the questions at the end. To prepare yourself, set some time aside, quiet yourself, and pray this prayer:

Lord Jesus, as I read and listen to these beloved sacred texts, open my mind and heart to see you more clearly and come to know you more deeply, that I may love and adore you more and more, and follow where you lead me and walk with me each day. AMEN.

Colossians 1:11-23 — Jesus holds all creation and mends its rifts

Paul's letter to the Christians in the region of Colossus gives us an amazing vision of Jesus Christ in his transcendent, everlasting essence. This Jesus, who loves tenderly and passionately, who empties himself, is before all things, the source and holder and healer of all things, and the complete image and full nature of God. Take your time as you read, and let your mind and heart expand to begin to catch a glimpse of Jesus in the fullness of his being.

May you be made strong with all the strength that comes from his glorious power, and may you be prepared to endure everything with patience, while joyfully giving thanks to the Father, who has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light. He has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.

He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers—all things have been created through him and for him. He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross.

And you who were once estranged and hostile in mind, doing evil deeds, he has now reconciled in his fleshly body through death, so as to present you holy and blameless and irreproachable before him— provided that you continue securely established and steadfast in the faith, without shifting from the hope promised by the gospel that you heard, which has been proclaimed to every creature under heaven. I, Paul, became a servant of this gospel.

Take a few minutes to let this text sink into your heart and mind. Then consider one or more of these questions:

- ◆ When have you experienced awe in someone's presence, or in the presence of something, where what you begin to see is how vastly more complex and deeper and larger that person or creature is than you ever realized?
- ◆ Can you keep this vision of Jesus Christ who is everlasting and all-holding, as you consider every text you have read so far, and as you recall the moments of his birth, his baptism, his ministry, and his death and resurrection? What changes for you, as you hold this vision in your mind and heart?
- ◆ What can we say or do, and how can we be – individually and together – to open this vision of Jesus Christ to people?

Madeline Hennig in Rome for Second Year of Service with Episcopal Church's Young Adult Service Corps

Parishioner Madeline Hennig returned to Rome, Italy on March 15 for a second year of service with the Episcopal Church's Young Adult Service Corps (YASC) at St. Paul's Within the Walls Church and its mission, the Joel Nafuma Refugee Center (JNRC). As soon as she returned to Europe, Madeline went to Paris for the 100th anniversary of the American Cathedral in Paris and a revival with Presiding Bishop Michael Curry. Madeline had the opportunity to lead a workshop about modern slavery and human trafficking, discussing how it happens and what churches can do about it. In attendance were members of the Convocation of Episcopal Churches in Europe, which is like a diocese for European parishes. In her community in Rome, Madeline has given training to volunteers about trafficking to educate them on what to look for. She has also hung up posters with the trafficking hotline number in the women's bathrooms.

Next was a revival service with Bishop Curry and Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell. Madeline had never heard of a revival, as it is not an Episcopal tradition. She found it interesting to see a different way to celebrate with others. Youth Across Europe was also there for a youth event. As someone who participated in several youth events, Madeline was so happy to see youth from around the Convocation come together! After the revival, the Episcopal Church and the Church of Sweden signed an agreement of full communion together, which was an historic moment for both churches.

It was a great weekend spent with friends and colleagues and Madeline even got to speak briefly with Bishop Michael Curry, which is always exciting to her. It was her fourth time meeting him in person.
