Reflections with Your Rector



As February turns the corner into March, we find that winter is not done with us yet! Be sure to thank the good folks who plow the roads and clear the sidewalks—including here at St. Luke's.

I find myself a bit on the fence about snow at this point in the year: I want less snow, except I want more snow up in the mountains. So, if I made the weather...

Hmm, I'm not sure that would work out so well for everyone. At best, I might get it right (at least for my liking) for a region, part of the time. But what would happen with me in control? Would I get it right for all God's critters even in my own little region of the world? I am quite sure that my over-attention to my own little region would not have good effects on other nearby or far-away regions. All creation is so darn interconnected—and I have so little comprehension of how the things I do and set in motion here have ripple-effects in other places.

I remember that movie, *Bruce Almighty*, where God gives to Bruce (Jim Carrey) all the powers of God. Bruce remains his narcissistic self. He uses his God-powers to make good for himself, not seeing for a while the impact of his decisions on others. He draws the moon closer to earth in order to make his girlfriend swoon with romance, and causes tidal waves and weather disasters. Even when he begins to get a glimmer of care for others (with God-powers, he hears everyone's prayers), he tries shortcuts, answering yes to every prayer uttered—leading to chaos around the world. For so much of the movie, Bruce remains the center of his own universe.

Erich Fromm, a widely read Jewish psychoanalyst in the 1940s and 1950s, wrote that the worship of God is an antidote for idolatry—especially self-idolatry. And there are many forms of idolatry, by which we construct gods to our liking that are in accord with our own impulses. One form that Fromm worried about, in light of World War II, was nationalism. He wrote, "Nationalism is our form of incest, is our idolatry, is our insanity. 'Patriotism' is its cult...Just as love for one individual which excludes the love for others is not love, love for one's country which is

not part of one's love for humanity is not love, but idolatrous worship." (*The Sane Society*, 1955)

Nationalism is particularly seductive, because it seems like we are caring for something beyond ourselves. But in reality, we are caring for an extension of ourselves and elevating it (and ourselves) above others.

Jesus said to Pilate, "My kingdom does not belong to this world. If my kingdom belonged to this world, my followers would be fighting to keep me from being handed over to the Jews. But as it is, my kingdom is not from here." (John 18:36) Jesus turned away from the temptation of self-idolatry when he resisted the devil, including the temptation to be all-powerful and in control.

The way of the kingdom of God is just different. God seems to take delight in self-emptying. The scripture for our meditation this month is Paul's amazing words about Jesus as an example for all of us—"Though he was in the form of God, he did not consider being equal with God something to exploit. But he emptied himself by taking the form of a slave and by becoming like human beings." (Phil. 2:6-7a)

During this Lent, what can we empty of ourselves for the sake of others and the world we share? What can we shed of attachments to things and ideas that have the potential to become idols? As St. Francis' prayer says, "For it is in giving that we receive, it is in pardoning that we are pardoned, and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life."

After the dry years of the pandemic and its precautions, it is wonderful to see St. Luke's burst again into life! I am delighted by the strong interest in the new book study, *Reading the Book of Revelation*. Due to snow, we postponed our start until March 7 (Tuesday) at 3:45 p.m. I am amazed at the rich conversation and exploration of prayer in the book group reading *The Ignatian Workout*. You can still sign up for the book study of *Hate Is My Neighbor* in the parish hall.

It was wonderful to see the turnout for the Chili Feed and the Pancake Supper put on by the Men's Group! Coffee hours are full of lively conversation and caring connection. Work days at the church are bringing fresh life to our facilities.

Join in prayer this Lent! Wednesdays at 12 p.m. for Noonday Prayer. Fridays at 12 p.m. for Stations of the Cross. First and third Tuesdays 5:30 p.m. for Contemplative Prayer. Sundays after the 10 a.m. service for a class on Prayer Life.

Take time this Lent to read the scriptures and thoughtful questions in "Who Is This Jesus?"

Who Is This Jesus?

Biblical Windows for Followers and Seekers of Christ

Each month, we open a biblical window through which we see and come to know Jesus. Last month, we read and meditated on Jesus speaking to the power of the world (from John 18) – his purpose to bring good news to the poor, sight to the blind, release to the captives, and news of God's favor to everyone. This month, Paul tells of the humility and selflessness of Jesus.

Lord Jesus, as I read and listen to these beloved sacred texts, open my mind and heart to see you more clearly and come to know you more deeply, that I may love and adore you more and more, and follow where you lead me and walk with me each day. AMEN.

Philippians 2:1-12 – Jesus empties himself for all

In his letter to the Christians in the Greek city of Philippi, Paul calls these followers of Jesus to live out of the spirit of love, and then writes a breathtaking summary about Jesus as the Son of God who gives himself away completely and does not grasp at power. Let these words sink in about who Jesus is.

If then there is any encouragement in Christ, any consolation from love, any sharing in the Spirit, any compassion and sympathy, make my joy complete: be of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind.

Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others. Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross.

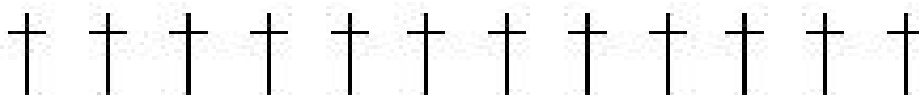
Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Therefore, my beloved, just as you have always obeyed me, not only in my presence, but much more now in my absence, work out your own salvation with fear and trembling.

Take a few minutes to let this text sink into your heart and mind.

Consider one or more of these questions:

- ◆ Paul encourages hearers to share in mind and heart in the same love and spirit of humility. What kind of love and humility do you see in Christ Jesus? What does this show you about the very heart and soul of Jesus?
- ◆ How does Jesus empty himself, and how does God fill that empty space? What is it like for you to empty yourself completely for others? What barriers get in the way of giving yourself away? How do you hear and respond to this call to follow the way of Jesus?
- ◆ Paul's words are for a community of faith, together. Where do you see your own faith community, together, living according to this way of Jesus? Where might you be falling short? Where might you ask for God's help in following Jesus in this way, together?

The Ignatian Workout: Daily Spiritual Exercises for a Healthy Faith, by Tim Muldoon (2004).

"*The Ignatian Workout*...is a program that shows us how to recognize and respond to a God who is *already* at work in us, inviting us into a deeper relationship and into richer lives of love and service."

Reading the Book of Revelation: Five Principles for Interpretation, by Alexander Stewart (2021).

"In *Reading the Book of Revelation*, Alexander Stewart offers five simple keys that unlock this difficult book...and will help you see that Revelation is not primarily about the future, but about how the future makes a difference for us today."

Hate Is My Neighbor, by Tom Alibrandi with Bill Wassmuth (1999).

This book tells the story of the courage of Father Bill Wassmuth and other civil rights leaders in North Idaho who banded together to shine light on the hateful and malicious acts of Aryan Nations members. This chilling story is a reminder that "if you want peace, work for justice."

What Is Your Prayer Life?

A Four-Part Exploration & Discussion Series, Sundays after the 10 a.m. Service Beginning March 5

What is your prayer life? This presentation, facilitated by parishioner Ern Warner, will consist of a discussion of common forms of prayer along with types of prayer that we habitually do but may not be aware of. A fuller awareness of a person's prayer life can provide a better foundation for discovery of new ways of deepening one's faith.

The following excerpt provides an overview of the presentation.

Everybody prays. People pray whether or not they call it prayer. We pray every time we ask for help, understanding, or strength, in or out of religion. Then, who and what we are speak out of us whether we know it or not. Our movements, our stillness, the expressions on our faces, our tone of voice, our actions, what we dream and daydream, as well as what we actually put into words say who and what we are.

Above all, through any feelings of anger and frustration, sadness and hurt, joy and excitement in victory, deliver us from hostility and scorn, and help us to see and follow your way of love. Open our minds and hearts in lovingkindness to each other and to those not yet here, and to the lands and waters for which we are responsible stewards.

Guide our city council and mayor, our citizens, and all who work to build a community that is good and wholesome for all, regardless of who they are or where they come from.
