Lead us, go before us, and help us to proclaim Christ's love in all we say and do. Help us recognize and rejoice in Christ, whom we meet in every person. Guide us as we open caring and courageous conversation. Let your holy fire burn brightly in this church, for the sake of the world around us.

- Paul's Letters from Prison Tuesday evenings at 5:30 p.m.
 - Beginning with Philippians, we will read Paul's four short letters from prison. Here is Paul, that great missionary apostle, facing the likely end of his life and looking to secure the faith of those who will carry on beyond his life. As we read these beautiful letters, we will reflect on the people who shaped faith for us, and the ways we have shaped faith for other. We each leave a legacy. What will be ours? How will we shape what lasts beyond us? What have we received, and what will we pass on?
 - <u>Materials</u>: The Bible (NRSV, CEB, or NIV versions or any other you have); *Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians and Philemon for Everyone*, by N.T. Wright (2023, 20th anniv. edition).
- Listening to God and Our Neighbors: Biblical Windows for Followers and Seekers of Christ In-home study and reflection. This collection of stories and readings from scripture has been created for us as a guide to help shape how we enter caring and vulnerably courageous conversations with God and with others around us. The collection includes examples of listening and responding to God, being sent, entering confrontations and hard conversations, breaking open new ground with new people, and being changed ourselves by conversations. We will also use videos and discussion tools from *Echo the Story*, and we will explore parts of the Bible not covered in these two resources. I look forward to walking with our young people through the Bible, and I hope you learn to discover how this sacred book is an amazing treasure!



This program consists of 10 sessions that consider the foundational pieces of Christian theology and practice. This program is based on a small group of people coming together, bringing their own experience and wisdom about the topic for that session, wondering together, and then hearing someone read the message for that session, followed by conversation about it. It is a mashup of Godly Play wondering and solid theology, offered in a way that helps people recognize their own experience with the topic whether or not they are a Christian. It is designed for folks who are curious about Christian faith and practice, and I can also see it being a fabulous space for folks in the faith deconstructing/reconstructing process.



Why Do We...?

Why do we have Holy Communion every week?

This summary from The Falls Church in Virginia gives us a helpful start in answering this question.

We celebrate Holy Communion every week for three major reasons: 1) it ties us to our ancestors in faith, the communion of saints, who have been observing this practice for 2000 years, 2) Jesus asked his followers to 'do this in remembrance of me,' and 3) because we believe and our scriptures tell us that Jesus shows up when we break bread together. (Posted 2018)



We are part of a worldwide fellowship spanning 2000 years. When we share in hearing God's Word and in receiving Holy Communion, we are sharing with all who have gone before us and all who are currently living. We find the earliest references to weekly communion in the Acts of the Apostles (breaking bread together on the first day of the week).

But why do it? Just because Jesus said, "Do this in remembrance of me"?

We do this because Jesus said, "This is my Body," "This is my Blood." We receive Christ's presence into our own bodies, together with each other. Week after week, year after year, we are nourished directly by the God who is always and forever self-giving. And we are changed. Just as our daily prayers and regular hearing of scripture change us, this holy meal changes us.


A Sacrament is "a sure and certain means" given by Christ for us to receive God's lifegiving grace. As St. Andrew's in New Orleans has posted, "Through the sacraments, our identities as children of God are enriched and made more real, and our kinship with our neighbors, our sisters and brothers in Christ, is strengthened and confirmed." So, come and receive — and expect to receive Christ who is making all things new.

Learning Opportunities

Saints You Should Know

(from Lesser Feasts and Fasts of the Episcopal Church)

Martin Luther King, Jr. (1929-1968) was a Baptist pastor, from a family of Baptist pastors. He studied theology deeply, and then became pastor of a church in Montgomery, Alabama. Southern segregation's brutality and relentlessness brought King fully into the resistance against indignity and the fight for human rights for Black Americans. He founded the Southern Christian Leadership Conference to lead disciplined non-violent demonstrations against racism. With companions and followers across races and religions, King pressed leaders in Washington DC to pass the Civil Rights Acts of the 1960s, and then began work on care and justice for all the poor. King faced threats for over eleven years, with attacks to his home and body. On April 4, 1968, an assassin shot and killed him. His "Mountain-top Experience" came after a cruel threat made to him on the telephone in 1957. "Alone in his kitchen he wept and prayed... He heard the Lord speaking to him and saying, 'Martin Luther, stand up for righteousness, stand up for justice,' and promising never to leave him alone—'No, never alone.'" (LFF, p. 227).



"Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that."

"In the End, we will remember not the words of our enemies, but the silence of our friends."

"He who passively accepts evil is as much involved in it as he who helps to perpetrate it. He who accepts evil without protesting against it is really cooperating with it."

"The first question which the priest and the Levite asked was: 'If I stop to help this man, what will happen to me?' But... the good Samaritan reversed the question: 'If I do not stop to help this man, what will happen to him?'"

Catherine of Siena (1347-1380) was born in Italy during the plague years, and survived childhood when many of her siblings (including her twin) did not. At age 16, she resisted an arranged marriage and instead devoted herself to isolated prayer in her parents' home, even when she became a Dominican sister. At age 21, she had a mystical experience of being wedded to Christ, and Christ asked her to enter the world again and to help people in need. She became a nurse, visiting hospitals and homes, and attracting helpers. She found public life invigorating, and began visiting prisons, arbitrating family fights, and calling for Church reform and for people's wholehearted love of God. During the years when France was influencing the selection of popes, Catherine appealed to other states to remain



loyal but also to restore order to the Church – and helped convince one pope to return to Rome. She died at a young age (33). For her strong theological writing and teaching, she is one of four women who have been named "Doctors" (saints who were great teachers) of the Catholic Church.

"The Perennial Philosophy," Aldous Huxley writes, "may be found among the traditional lore of peoples in every region of the world, and in its fully developed forms it has a place in every one of the higher religions." With great wit and stunning intellect—drawing on a diverse array of faiths, including Zen Buddhism, Hinduism, Taoism, Christian mysticism, and Islam—Huxley examines the spiritual beliefs of various religious traditions and explains how they are united by a common human yearning to experience the divine. He paints an expansive portrait of the American evangelical movement. Through the eyes of televangelists and small-town preachers, celebrity revivalists and everyday churchgoers, he tells the story of a faith cheapened by fear and a reputation stained by scandal. Building Bridges: Healing Divides Initiative Begins

We at St. Luke's are about to embark on a great journey as an inaugural member of the Building Bridges: Healing Divides initiative our Diocese is offering. And we want to include you!

Our journey starts by collecting some anonymous information from each of you. Throughout May, we will post six statements about St. Luke's, and we will ask you to respond on a four-point scale to each statement. Again, these responses are anonymous, and having many people participate will help us gather valuable data. Keep an eye out and please take the time to fill it in.



In June, we'll ask you for a bit more time – approximately 20-30 minutes – to complete the RenewalWorks spiritual life inventory. This is an anonymous, confidential, online assessment about each person's spiritual life. Our team will receive a report summarizing general patterns across all folks in our church. More responses make for a more valid and complete survey, so we ask each member of our congregation to make time for this assessment. More information will be coming.

We are also looking for seven to twelve people to participate in four workshops with us as we delve into the information we gather. These will likely be held during June through September. Each session will involve about two hours of discussion about our spiritual journeys and RenewalWorks responses. We will explore where we have been, where we are now, where we feel called to go, and how can we get there.

The result of all of this work is an assessment of our spiritual vitality at St. Luke's. Alongside other congregations in our diocese, it will inspire us and our leadership to continue discovering who Jesus is and what it means for us to follow him more closely. It will help us to focus upon spiritual growth and identify ways that God is calling us to grow more deeply.

These are exciting initiatives for us at St. Luke's and will inspire us as we live to be disciples of Jesus in our congregation and in our community.


