

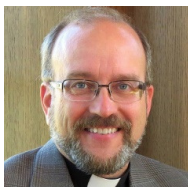

Reflections with Your Rector

The first day of June was the last Sunday in Easter Season. Alleluia, Christ the Lord of Life is risen! We also marked when Jesus ascended from this earth, from his friends and followers, leaving them as his legacy and giving to them the ongoing work of proclaiming God's good news.



Christ Jesus ascended – rose, climbed, soared, returning into his full and intertwined embrace with God the Father. We proclaim this moment in Jesus' life as a core part of our faith – every Sunday, we say together that "he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father."

June 1 also was exactly six years since I was named rector of St. Luke's – and just three months shy of seven years since I first came to serve at St. Luke's as vicar. It has been a joy and delight to be among you during these years. And I am looking forward to returning among you in late August after my sabbatical. In the meantime, do not worry, but enjoy this time together as a community that is enriched with sound and loving leadership, with readiness to run and share the good news of God's unbounded love for people across this region of North Idaho, with eagerness to serve and come alongside those in any need and to seek and serve Christ in every person, to continue together in dedicated discipleship and to share God's love through courageous and caring conversation.

We each go forth – you together here, and my wife Heather and I far away – as we get ready to walk and run out into our own Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and all the ends of the earth, wherever the Holy Spirit opens doors for us and calls us. St. Luke's, don't wait for my return. Now, for these next months, I am getting out of your way. It's your time to burst forth with God's grace and joy and passion. Christ is alive! Christ is risen! Christ is risen, and we are Christ's body here and now. Let it be so!

Did you know Muslims, with us Christians, believe that Jesus ascended into heaven, and that he will come again to reign on earth? Yes, to Muslims, Jesus is one of the absolutely greatest prophets, along with Mary who gave birth to Jesus as a virgin, and along with Moses and Elijah

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and Enoch and many others. They just do not accept that Jesus was both fully divine and fully human, was God incarnate, and was crucified and rose again from the dead. These points are where we differ most significantly, and these are profound differences that, to us, make all the difference in our understanding of how God acts and interacts with creation – so closely, so intimately. And yet, it is remarkable how deeply the people of Islamic faith regard Jesus of Nazareth, blessed be he.

Jesus rose, climbed, soared in the body. Jesus ascended in the body, wounds and all – not as a disembodied and ephemeral divine being, but fully human while fully divine, touchable, tangible. Christ Jesus, God incarnate, ascended into the heavens of God's full presence, taking our humanity into the very heart of God. Now and for all of the rest of eternity, our human nature is part of God's inner life, part of God through Jesus. Through Jesus, Emmanuel, God-with-us, the Triune God knows us completely – not just from the outside as a creator but from the inside as one with us.

Jesus remains embodied eternally. He did not shed this body once ascended. He remains in this his risen body for all eternity. Even returning to glory, Christ the Lord gave of himself and continues his self-giving to the point of embracing being changed for our sakes, for such deep and passionate love for us. This is the very nature of God who is always emptying of self for us and all creatures across this entire universe.

Christ Jesus is constantly advocating and pleading for us. Humanity itself is now part of God's whole inner life, and God knows and hears our weakness and waywardness from the inside out and yet still pours out love because we are intimately known. As we sing in the hymn, "Alleluia, sing to Jesus," we can pray these words constantly: "Intercessor, friend of sinners, earth's redeemer, plead for me." Because, as it says in Romans 8, "*Who is to condemn?*" It is Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us."

Christ Jesus in a singular body is not here. He has ascended. But, he is also here with us. More than that, he has given us himself through the Word and the Sacrament – and so, we are Christ's body. We! We ARE Christ's body, here and now, together. Through Christ, we are the embodiment of Emmanuel, God-with-us.

The Gospel reading for June 1 is part of Jesus' legacy prayer as he faced toward his own death. Now, at the end of Easter Season, after Jesus' ascension, we pick it up again, and hear it fresh as the ascended Jesus' ongoing appeal for us his followers who are his friends, now in his place in the full and undivided union of God. Imagine this with me, friends. Jesus, as he rises from us, is already making this his ongoing appeal to God, and to us. "Friends, I am leaving you – and you are my legacy. You. I am no longer in the world as I was for these brief years. But you are in the world. Father, here they are, in the world. Protect them, make their joy complete, and, as I have sent them, sanctify them – make them holy." Just before this prayer, Jesus has given us a thickly intertwined picture of how we are iconnected with each other and with him, just as he and the Father are intertwined.

We are in this together. And this is his legacy – we are his legacy, and the work he has left for us is his legacy for us to carry. We are his Body here on earth. And we do not carry out this work on our own strength. We carry out Christ's work by the power of the Holy Spirit, who opens the ways for us into places we have never been. Don't keep staring up into heaven – Jesus will return, and in the meantime, you are his body, so you carry on his legacy.

Will you be a witness? Will you be an advocate? And will you leave a legacy? What kind of legacy will you leave for others to carry forward?

Friends, I am so looking forward to what Heather and I discover, and what we can bring back to share with you. And I am so looking forward to what you discover and do together, here, in these weeks ahead. Thank God for Christ Jesus who is our advocate and guide and friend and lover. Thank God for the Holy Spirit who opens our hearts and minds, who opens doors for us to enter and new places to discover God already at work. Thank God for you, who have responded to the call of God and who carry the holy fire.

In the end, all of our destinies lie in the path of the ascension. In the end, we are all taken up into God, just as Jesus who has gone before. So, dear friends, let us rise together and claim the faith that binds us across all times and places.

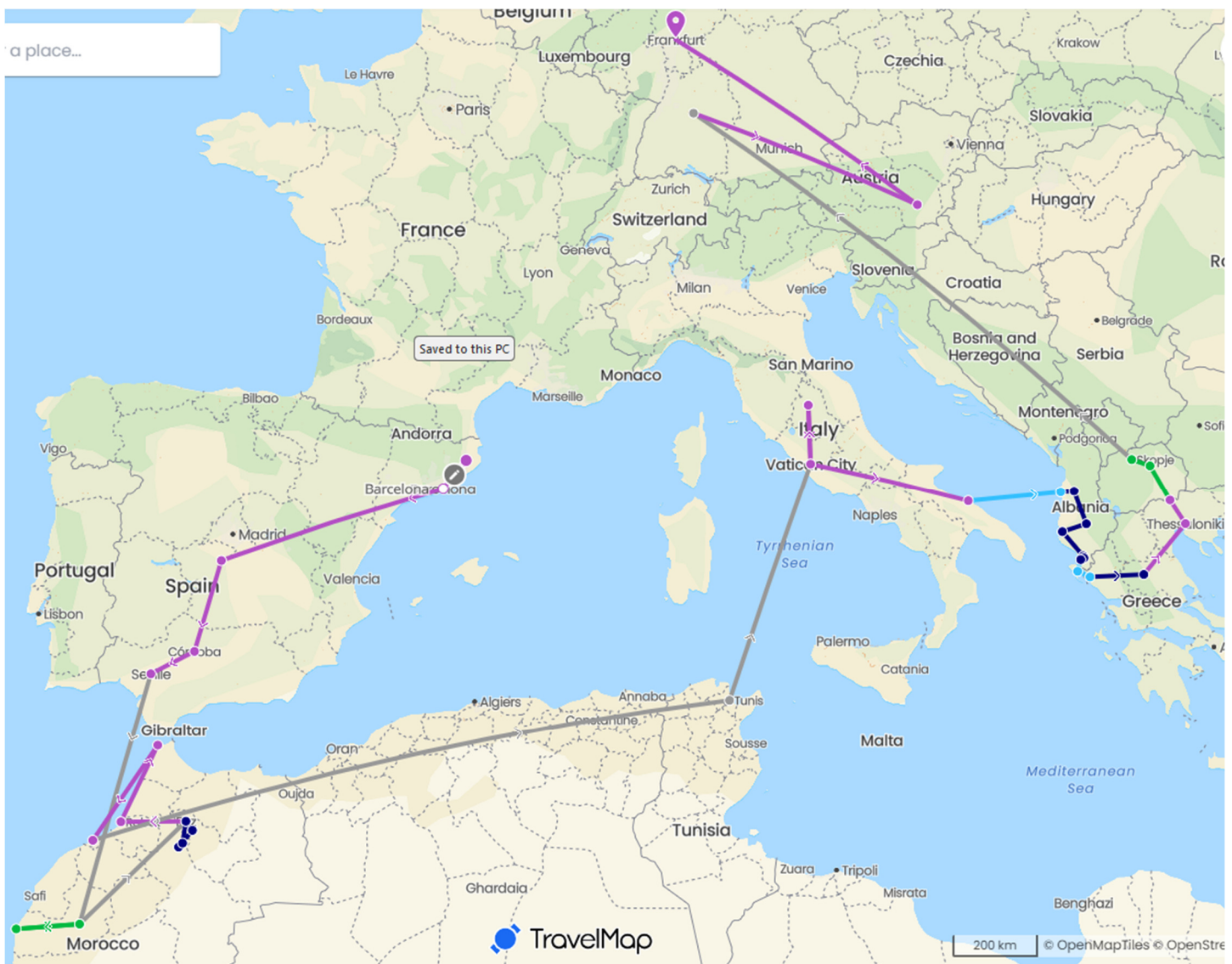
Fr. David on Sabbatical Through Mid-August

Below is the map and itinerary of the sabbatical adventures of Fr. David Gortner and his wife, The Very Rev. Heather VanDeventer, Dean of the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist in Spokane. Fr. David will be gone from June 2 through August 18.

They are covering a lot of ground (and water)! It is a journey of about 10,000 miles around parts of the Mediterranean. They will be in Spain and Morocco for the month of June, where they honeymooned some 25 years ago. In July, they will begin in Tunisia and move on to Italy, Albania, Greece, and North Macedonia. At the end of July, they will possibly return to Spain, and then connect with their children and some friends in Germany and Austria.

This journey walks David and Heather through places of deep and intense religious history. They will touch some spaces of journeys of Paul and his companions, later early Christian movement around the Roman Empire, Jewish presence in all these places, and the rise and spread of Islam across these regions. The people of these religions did not always treat one another well, and sometimes dealt cruelty upon each other. But there were and are important places of harmonious and respectful co-existence and creative partnership.

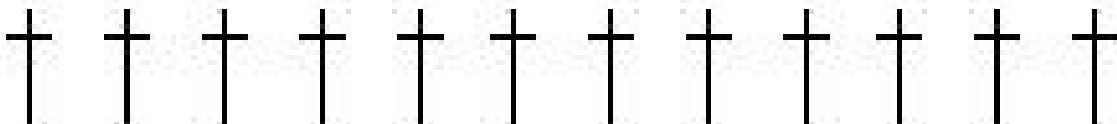

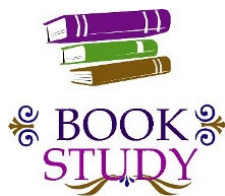

Our St. Luke's Building Bridges; Healing Divides Grant Team invites our church members to join us on Saturday, June 7, from 12:30-3:30 p.m. in the Great Hall of the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist in Spokane for a free workshop from Braver Angels called “Depolarizing Within.” No registration is necessary. Lunch will not be served, so please come prepared to start work at 12:30 p.m.

This workshop is designed to foster skills to help individuals of faith to lessen the effects of polarization when they encounter them in their political conversations.

Braver Angels (formerly **Better Angels**) is a New York-based 501(c)(3) nonprofit dedicated to political depolarization. The organization runs workshops, debates, and other events where “red” (conservative) and “blue” (liberal) participants attempt to better understand one another's positions and discover their shared values. This is an excellent opportunity for us as a church community to really hone our “courageous conversation” skills, a key component of St. Luke's Mission Statement. 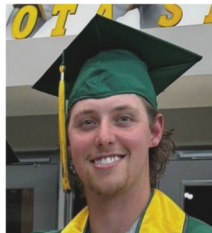

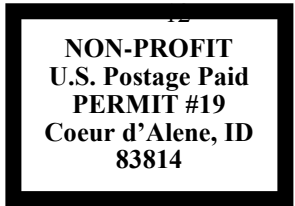
