Reflections with Your Rector

There is so much to share with you and the wider church and community. We have been deeply enriched. It will take time to share with you and the wider



church and community all of what we learned, saw, heard and experienced. Starting in the next couple of weeks, we will begin week-by-week to bring you some of the images and insights from our time in countries across western Mediterranean Europe and Africa. We saw Jewish faith communities slowly reemerging after the annihilation of Jews by Nazis across Europe. We saw slow and cautious increase of Christian faith communities in Muslim lands, and slow and cautious increase of Muslim faith communities in Christian lands. We learned about the roots of the rich spiritual traditions of Kabbalah and Sufism in Jewish and Muslim faiths during the Middle Ages. We visited shared holy sites and places of deep spiritual importance to people in all three Abrahamic faiths. We met people across different countries working to recover the best times of positive interfaith cooperation and respectful coexistence.

During these months, you continued to gather and move forward as a community of faith. Thank you for the ways you held together, worked together, prayed together, and served together in this part of our world, while we were abroad. Many thanks to Revs. Holladay, David, Mary, and Glenda for their leadership and service during this summer. And to Ian, Dave, Michelle, Rod, Farley, Kate, Kristin, and all church members who contributed to moving forward. And to DeDe and Ty for their steady ministry in the office and in worship. I am so very, very grateful.

Here are a few tastes of our journey.



In Spain, we dove deep into historic places in the Jewish neighborhoods and Muslim-era sites in Girona, Toledo, Cordoba, and Sevilla. These places span over 1,500 years of Abrahamic religions' history. They showed us stories of cooperation and conflict, respect and prejudice, trust and suspicion — and how rulers set the stage for positive and negative relationships. The time of a more "peaceable kingdom" was during the centuries between AD 711 and 1348, when under Moorish Muslim rule there was mostly peaceful coexistence and cooperation between Muslims, Christians and Jews — although there was distinct classism, with Christians and Jews in lower classes. As Catholic Spanish rulers retook control of Spain, Jewish oppression and anti-Jewish violence increased. In 1492 and 1493, Jews and Muslims



were expelled from Spain. Spain is still finding its way as a nation in affirming the presence of other faiths – including non-Catholic Christian faiths – after the deep Catholic form of Christian Nationalism of prior centuries and the manipulative use of that "Christian" nationalism by the dictator Franco. Leaders and members in the Spanish Reformed Episcopal Church shared with us the challenges of being different types of Christians in Spain.




Our Moroccan journey began with time at the Gnaoua World Music Festival in Essaouira, a city on the Atlantic coast that was a special favorite of Jews when many lived in Morocco. We continued with visits to sacred sites and current faith communities in Marrakesh, and to villages where the High Atlas Foundation is guiding Muslim and Jewish people together in sustainable agriculture with mutual appreciation. In and around Fez, we toured old synagogues and mosques, visited tombs and caves held by all three faiths as holy sites of pilgrimage, and met people leading the reconstruction of a Catholic monastery that sparked profound interfaith cooperation in the 1950s through 1970s, where the prior Moroccan king in his younger years as crown prince attended a global interfaith conference and was inspired to make Morocco a nation that welcomed and affirmed diverse

religious communities. We met a Christian interfaith campus minister at an American-like national liberal arts university, saw the Islamic universities and schools founded by women over 1,100 years ago, and met a key leader of the American Language Center. In Rabat (the capital city), we met leaders of an ecumenical and interfaith theological school who are helping Christian leaders better understand Islam, and Muslim leaders better understand Christianity.

Jews were in Morocco already by the time the Roman Empire reached there, and Christians were present and active for the centuries prior to the rise of Islam and its sweep across north Africa. Over the last century, Morocco is one of the few Muslim nations with explicit laws of tolerance and respect for other religions. When the Nazis attempted to get the king to turn over Jews, he refused and responded, "We are all Moroccans here." In recent years, there are even places where people of the three Abrahamic faiths come together for shared lftar meals during the fast of Ramadan.

July took us to five other countries. After a week in Tunisia and Italy, we took an overnight ferry (set up like a cruise, with private cabin) from Italy to Albania. This began our journey through Albania, northern Greece, and North Macedonia. Albania is one of the countries demonstrating the strongest interfaith respect, co-existence, and collaboration. This small country, with an incredibly complicated history and a terribly repressive era of Communist rule, has been reborn as a nation with deep pride. It was long a place where Abrahamic faiths coexisted peacefully. During the Communist era, all

religions' houses of worship were destroyed or claimed for nonreligious purposes – and cemeteries were destroyed to further annihilate faith-related memory. But since Albania peacefully overthrew Communist rule, religion has reemerged with strength like before. We saw amazing new Orthodox and Catholic churches and Muslim mosques and shrines. We saw shared pilgrimage sites. We met religious leaders working across faiths for interfaith partnership for the public good. Orthodox and Catholic faith run deep. The Sufi Muslim tradition also runs deep in Albania and intentionally draws together strands from different Abrahamic religions as well as more local cultural religion.



Greece was far more complicated in its history of interfaith co-existence and collaboration. Of course, there is the interplay of the rise of Christianity and decline of Greek polytheism. But there is also the relatively peaceful coexistence of Orthodox Christianity and Islam in both Greece and Turkey under the rule of the Ottoman Empire. When war erupted between these nations and brought on the demise of the Ottoman Empire, the Treaty of Lausanne enforced an agreed mutual deportation – so Turkish Orthodox Christians were forced to move to Greece, and Greek Muslims were forced to move to Turkey.

In our time on the island of Corfu and in the city of Thessaloniki, we learned that Jewish presence at one time was very strong. Thessaloniki initially drew Jews expelled from Spain, and then centuries later from eastern Europe and Russia during times of antisemitic cruelty. It became known among Jews as "the Jerusalem of the Balkans." But Nazi incursion – and Greek cooperation

with the Nazis – resulted in destruction of the Jewish neighborhoods, seizure of property, and deportation of 54,000 Jews to concentration camps (and over 1,500 from the small city of Corfu).

In North Macedonia, we found a spirit similar to Albania's in commitment to peaceful coexistence of Christians and Muslims. The level of cooperation and partnership is not as strong, but there are intriguing shared sacred places, including houses of worship that have been both Muslim and Orthodox Christian in history, as well as sacred water springs. These are pilgrimage sites at different times of the year. There are important shrines to Saints Cyril and Methodius, who brought Christian faith – and an early alphabetic system for their language – to the region. And Mother Theresa is regarded with deep reverence. There is even a statue of her at the main airport.

At the end of our journey in August, our time in Austria, Germany and the Netherlands was also deeply enriching, particularly in visiting important places in Christian Reformation history and in visiting cities where we have family roots.

I hope this gives you a good sense of the breadth and depth of our journey. People were so good to us as visiting tourists, particularly when we identified ourselves as clergy who were on a journey of discovery of coexistence and cooperation of Abrahamic faiths. We were thrilled to connect with Episcopal, worldwide Anglican and other Protestant folks in these countries. We have formed interfaith and ecumenical relationships that we hope to strengthen and build more meaningful connections for the Episcopal Church and for interested American universities and faith communities. We hope to help foster stronger interfaith connection and collaboration here in this country, and particularly in our own region here. This is a deeply important way we can share the love of Christ by how we love and respect our neighbors. And, we grow in our own faith as we listen to and learn from others about their faith.

Building Bridges: Healing Divides Fall Update



As mentioned in previous articles, our second-year participation in the Building Bridges: Healing Divides initiative will include developing a ministry experiment for our congregation to participate in this fall.

Our ministry experiment will focus on expanding our work with NIC, with the goal of coming alongside to support as we are able.

We've spent the summer gathering data on possibilities for our ministry experiment, both with interviews with various NIC folks, and asking for your input. Many thanks to all of you who participated in this data gathering exercise!

Our BB: HD team met to formulate ideas that we will explore for our ministry experiment. It's too soon yet to fully explain what we hope to do, but we can share some basic ideas.

We believe we will look to provide two hospitality events this fall. The first is a St. Luke's Oktoberfest – Celebrating and Appreciating NIC Faculty: a party for us, and a chance to show our appreciation to NIC faculty. The second would be an expanded "Lessons and Carols" offered at Fort Sherman Chapel in December before finals and winter break. More details to come as we gather a little more information about each of these options.

We are also looking into more ways to support the Center for New Directions. CND is designed to assist single parents and displaced homemakers with community resources and exploration of career and educational paths. We don't know exactly what this will look like just yet, but will share more as we are able.

The BB: HD team is continuing to collect information and fine tune our ideas. We will be attending a bigger cohort meeting with other congregational teams on the second weekend of September where we can more fully explore these ideas. We should be able to provide a lot more information after that gathering.








Coffee Hour Hosts Needed

Update on Fundraiser for New Bus for Orchard Ridge

St. Luke's helped found Orchard Ridge Senior Living and has partnered with them for many years in providing a faith-based loving home for older adults



Back in April of this year they initiated a campaign seeking donations to help fund the purchase of a 14-passenger wheelchair-accessible bus. This bus will

greatly enhance the quality of life for their residents by providing them with safe and reliable transportation to medical appointments, shopping centers and social events. Many residents rely on wheelchairs or walkers for mobility, and having a specialized bus will ensure they can travel comfortably and with dignity.

St. Luke's set an initial goal of \$1,500 to support this campaign. As of this last week, St. Luke's has donated \$2,785 towards the bus. Orchard Ridge is currently at a total of \$69,875 toward the purchase of the bus, which they estimate will cost approximately \$95,000.

The generosity of the members of St. Luke's never ceases to amaze me. As your representative members on the Board of Orchard Ridge, Mark Wallace and I want to thank everyone for their support of this important campaign.




