Here are some of St. Luke's significant actions and achievements in 2025!

- ◆ Children's Chapel steadily maintained
- ◆ New gathering for young adults (Room 4U)

- ◆ Significant renewal and re-ordering of the chancel area in our nave
- ◆ Grant award to support restoration of exterior siding of our historic building
- ◆ Recognition as a historic site
- ◆ Beginning of ambitious gathering and writing of St. Luke's history
- ◆ Initial plans for improvement of entry and courtyard areas, following a generous dedicated gift
- ◆ Continued ministries of prayer, pastoral care, and provision for needs
- ◆ Donation of thousands of dollars' worth in food and personal care to area food banks
- ◆ Public ministry: services, connections, support for the vulnerable, and calls for social responsibility and the common good in many different organizations and networks across this region

- ◆ Effective shared leadership and mutual support during my summer sabbatical and vacation time
- ◆ Strengthening of music ministry, including welcoming of Eric Betz as Director of choirs
- ◆ Strengthened pledges for continuing solid ministry together in 2026

Together, St. Luke's did all of this even while I was abroad with Heather for nearly three months, and even while we waited with hope for Rev. Mary Ayers' ability to return to work with us and eventually needed to say farewell to her. And across the year, people continued to keep us going steadily in the day-to-day and week-to-week help with finances and payments, regular building upkeep, supplies for kitchen and bathrooms, preparation and clean-up for Sunday worship, welcoming people and helping new folks find their way, pastoral visits to people who are not able to come to church, watching our budget and investments, bringing together people who help lead our worship service, beautifying our gardens and landscape, distributing food and knitting prayer shawls, and just offering a helping hand where needed.

St. Luke's continues to be a healthy congregation. We are delighted to have new people join us, sad to see some leave, and are eager to have more people discover the beauty and depth of our faith and the ways we seek to follow Jesus. As I look back on our goals for 2025 (which were continuations of our 2024 goals), I am proud of what we have done together.

Our 2025 goals. In 2025, we decided to continue some of our key 2024 goals, to grow and strengthen our ministry and structural care in these four key areas: strengthening spiritual life, strengthening relationships inside and outside the church, strengthening shared leadership, and strengthening our buildings. These goals are listed on p. 3 of this newsletter, along with my sense of how we did in each and what are some examples of what we did. How do you think we did with pursuing and achieving these goals last year?

What would you like to see happen at St. Luke's and through St. Luke's in 2026?

What do you hope we can strengthen? Where do you hope to see us grow?

Who do you hope we can reach with God's unbounded love in 2026?

How would you like to offer yourself in service and leadership at and through St. Luke's?

You've heard me say it before – it takes a village. We are Christ's body, together. No matter what your age or experience, everyone plays a part in this body of Christ that we share and offer to the world around us. May the Holy Spirit freshly fill and energize us, so we can follow Jesus in his purpose:

Adult Formation

Recommended Readings for the Whole Congregation

Fr. David is asking us to read together these books over the course of this program year, as we continue to build our strengths and habits for courageous and caring conversations as followers of Jesus.

I Never Thought of it That Way by Monica Guzman – “Learn how to bring curiosity and courage to even the most difficult conversations across America’s polarized political divide with these actionable tools for navigating challenging disagreements.” We will join NIC in their community-wide reading of this book.

How We Learn to Be Brave by Bp. Mariann Budde – “Bishop Budde explores the full range of decisive moments, from the most visible and dramatic (the decision to go), to the internal and personal (the decision to stay), to brave choices made with an eye toward the future (the decision to start), those born of suffering (the decision to accept that which we did not choose), and those that come unexpectedly (the decision to step up to the plate).”

Transforming Evangelism by Fr. David – Episcopalians’ hands-off approach has led to a crisis of evangelism across our culture and with our own children. “How can Episcopalians reclaim evangelism primarily as an enriching spiritual practice?” How shall we practice evangelism in today’s multicultural but fractured society? Fr. David provides spiritual and conversational practices that set healthy habits for respectful evangelism.

We the Fallen People by Robert Tracy McKenzie – “The success and survival of American democracy have never been guaranteed. What we must do, argues the author, is take an unflinching look at the very nature of democracy — its strengths and weaknesses, what it can promise, and where it overreaches. And this means we must take an unflinching look at ourselves. McKenzie, following C. S. Lewis, claims there are only two reasons to believe in majority rule: because we have confidence in human nature — or because we don't. The Founders subscribed to [biblical and philosophical ideas] that humans are fallen and their virtue is always doubtful, and they wrote the U.S. Constitution to frame a republic intended to handle our weaknesses.”

The Bible – Fr. David recommends reading these books of the Bible this year

- ◆ The Acts of the Apostles– the great adventure of the birth and growth of the Church
- ◆ The Book of Proverbs– a collection of wisdom and guidance, good for our times
- ◆ The Gospels of Luke and Matthew– we are finishing Luke and beginning Matthew.
- ◆ The Book of Genesis– the starting point of all Abrahamic faiths.

All church groups and households are encouraged to pick a book at a time to read, but to begin if possible with ***I Never Thought of It That Way***. This book is now the selection of the Wednesday 4 p.m. book group.

Confirmation Preparation for Kids in Grades 5-9



Parents, if you have kids in 5th through 9th grade, they are old enough to begin the process toward confirmation. Here at St. Luke's, we want all who are confirmed to begin with a good reading knowledge of the Bible, so we begin by walking through the Bible together. The Bible is this amazing, complex collection of books that covers thousands of years of human experience of God. In the Episcopal Church, we rely deeply on the Bible. We learn many of the stories in it, but how many of us have read the Bible and know “the path of God's love all the way from the beginning to the end, from Adam's creation to John's revelation?”

High School Youth Confirmation Class on Zoom, February 8 through April 19

On Sunday evenings from February 8 through April 19 from 7–8:30 p.m. high schoolers will journey through Confirmation in the Episcopal Church — encouraging and inviting our youth to ask the hard questions and grapple with their own understanding of what they believe and why. What does it mean to be an Episcopalian? Facilitated small group break-outs will provide time for conversation with peers of the same age. Meetings will be virtual via Zoom. Over the course of this 10-week class, we'll be joined by clergy, lay leaders, and faith formation staff from across the Diocese who will lead the lessons and conversations.



Confirmation is one of the sacraments in the Episcopal Church. Confirmation gives us the opportunity to learn about and then avow our faith, more fully comprehending the teachings and beliefs of the Episcopal tradition. 

Learning Opportunities



Building Bridges: Healing Divides Update

While our work with our Diocese on our Building Bridges: Healing Divides initiative is coming to an end, our efforts at St. Luke's in our community and especially our partnerships with North Idaho College grow ever stronger.

It has been an exciting two-year journey learning from the BB: HD initiative to help us as a congregation grow our muscles by practicing meaningful courageous conversation, engaging in partnership with our colleagues at NIC, and experiencing new ways to be disciples of Jesus Christ.

The last part of our work was a three-part ministry experiment to help us grow our partnership with NIC. We held events to meet different contingencies from the campus to offer our friendship, support and partnership. Our first event, Oktoberfest with the incomparable Max Mendez and Beer Choir, was widely attended by our congregation and friends, and about 15 folks from NIC. We made excellent contacts, especially with The Center for New Directions and the music department. Our continued efforts with campus visits and interactions will continue to open doors for us as a congregation.

Our next event, the Christmas Carols and Readings service in early December, saw more than 50 people attend from St. Luke's, the neighborhood and the NIC community. Three NIC students helped to lead us in carol singing with harp, guitar and electric guitar. Fr. David accompanied us on the piano and Julia Hossack on violin. There were plenty of Christmas treats and cider for all to enjoy after the service. This even opens the door for further music partnership as NIC rebuilds its music program.

Our final event, held in late January, brought together St. Luke's and clients of NIC's Center for New Directions (CND), which assists single parents and displaced homemakers with community resources and exploration of career and educational paths. The Parish Hall, reception area and Alison Library were hopping with about 70 people to play games and enjoy a picnic lunch. Twenty-two families from CND came with many children and about 25 St. Luke's members were on hand to show appreciation and love. Each family received one or two bonding opportunities, which included sessions at Triple Play, Suset Bowling, Regal Cinemas and Cascadia Pizza. It was a great introduction, and we hope that this leads to more opportunities where we might be a resource to help when the need arises.

As we come to the end of our two-year partnership with the BB: HD initiative, our work continues. We are now engaging with the NIC Community in their book group and jointly reading *I Never Thought of It That Way, How to Have Fearlessly Courageous Conversations in Difficult Times*, by Monica Guzmán. More details on that partnership will be forthcoming.

We'll continue to offer support and partnership with The Center for New Directions and hope to continue to develop relationships with faculty and staff for more joint ventures.

We as a congregation continue to grow our spiritual lives and continue to offer Christ's endless love to our congregation and community. One outcome of this growth is the addition of a new group for young adults called Room 4U, a bi-monthly safe space for young adults to explore the big questions in life and participate in spiritual encouragement. And members of the congregation continue to step up and offer programs and Children's Chapel for our youngest members, while we search for a new Minister of Christian Formation and Discipleship.

It is a great joy to be walking in partnership with you as disciples of Christ.

Annual Meeting Preview

Below are highlights of a few of the updates that will be included in the Annual Report.

Facilities


St. Luke's is preparing for several important building projects in 2026 focused on stewardship, accessibility and care for our historic church. Plans include improvements to the courtyard and columbarium to create a more peaceful and inviting space, replacement of the building access ramp (and likely the main stairs) to meet current codes, and the start of exterior siding replacement in coordination with historic requirements. We are also continuing to evaluate a sprinkler fire suppression system and expect to bring the necessary water service into the building during courtyard work. In addition, the lychgate will receive a refresh this summer. Updates will be shared as plans move forward—please keep these projects in your prayers.

St. Luke's History Committee

The History Committee has been sifting through a plethora of information about our church. Much of this was compiled by Tim Shepperd, Lisa Nunlist and Farley Green. We are organizing by decade and identifying what to include. We have an outline for the first two chapters. Our goal is to create a small pamphlet that highlights St. Luke's, a booklet that is more comprehensive, a comprehensive link on the website, and a coloring page that highlights the architecture.

Finances

Through parishioners' continued gifts of time, talent and treasure, St. Luke's has continued to share, celebrate and embody Jesus Christ's overflowing, unconditional love in North Idaho. Your faithful financial gifts have allowed your church to remain in good financial standing. St. Luke's ended the 2025 year in a strong financial position. In 2025, our total giving was \$395,960 against total expenditures of \$391,968. The congregation contributed generously to capital improvement projects and Memorial Fund donations. Our long-term endowment funds also increased by \$274,684 due to strong market performance. As we enter budget year 2026, the Vestry has approved a balanced operating budget of \$385,500.
